## Stitching Snippets

Embroidery is thousands of years old, with ancient examples in China, Egypt, and Northern Europe, and even dating to 30,000 years ago in the form of warm, reinforced clothing. Embroidery has evolved from a practical skill to an art form used to document personal stories and cultural history, and it can be done with diverse materials like thread, silk, gold, or even human hair. Machine embroidery, invented in the 19th century, democratized fashion by making detailed designs more accessible.

#### **Ancient Origins & Practical Uses**

#### • Prehistoric Reinforcement:

The earliest form of embroidery, dating back around 30,000 years, was used for practical purposes, such as reinforcing clothing to provide warmth in cold climates.

#### • Early Documented Evidence:

Ancient examples have been found in China from the Zhou Dynasty, and in Northern Europe from the Iron Age.

#### Storytelling:

In cultures where literacy was limited, embroidery served as a visual diary, with women creating "story cloths" to record important events and personal experiences.

#### Materials & Symbolism

#### • A Variety of Threads:

While cotton and silk are common, embroidery has also been done with less conventional materials, including gold and silver threads, which historically symbolized wealth and power.

#### • Human Hair:

Intriguing uses of human hair in embroidery have been documented, including adorning Buddhist images in China and creating a symbolic gift for a marriage proposal in Mexico.

#### Non-Traditional Surfaces:

Modern artists are expanding the boundaries of embroidery by applying it to diverse surfaces like paper, wood, and even X-ray films.

The Art of Ukrainian Easter Eggs "Pysanky" By Samia Khan



Sparkling colors burst from the decorated shell of a Ukrainian egg is a miracle of beauty. Well over 2000 years ago, before the time of Christ, people were carrying on the custom of decorating eggs. The practice originated in the prehistoric Trypillian culture. Tales reveal that the people who lived in the region (now known as Ukraine) worshiped the sun. They believe that it was source of all life. As it warmed the earth and allowed all to grow and flourish underneath it. In creating these delicate treasures, the peasant folk were influenced by the belief that great power is embodied in the egg and they decorated eggs in the spring to celebrate the warming of the sun as it brought new joy and vigor to life. As the Eggs were believed to contain great powers, for example, a friend was a farmer, he might be presented with an egg decorated with shafts of wheat wishing him bountiful harvest. Young married couples would often be presented with an egg decorated with a chicken design. Since the chicken is a symbol of fertility, it was hoped that the family would grow in number. With the introduction of Christianity to Ukraine in 988 A.D. the "Sun" became the "Son" and the ancient customs were absorbed into the Christian celebration of Christ's resurrection. The pysanky were exchanged on Easter morning between friends and relatives. What most of us call Ukrainian Easter eggs are in fact only one variety of decorated eggs more formally celled Pysanka. The plural-more than one Pysanka-is Pysanky. Pysanka from the Ukrainian verb Pysaty meaning 'to write'. The word refers to the writing on the egg. The art of making pysanky is called Pysankarstvo. The design are "written" in hot wax with a special tool called a Kistka which has a small funnel attached to hold a small amount of liquid wax. The wax protects the pores of the shell from the dye. The artist known as Pysankarka writes part of design. Dyes the egg one color, and writes more until the end. When all the layers of wax are melted off to reveal the final design.







The earliest needle-made laces like reticella were constructed by withdrawing threads from fabric. In the 16<sup>th</sup> century this evolved into "punto in aria" or "stitch in the air" leading to more elaborate shapes and eventually the true needle laces like Gros Point de Venise, Alençon, and Aemilia Ars. This introductory class will make a classic 16<sup>th</sup> century geometric lace square using punto in aria techniques.






